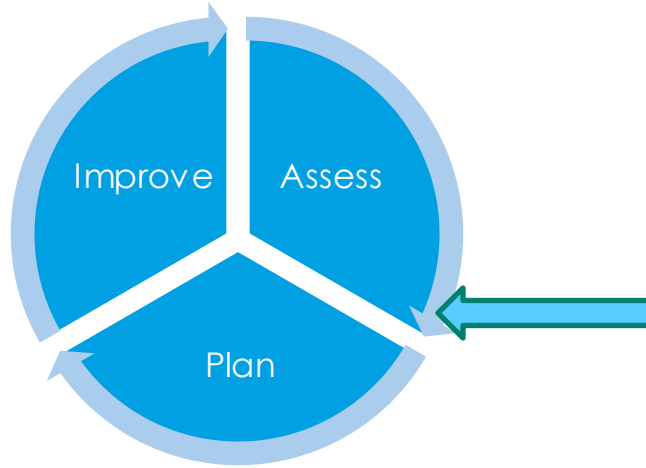

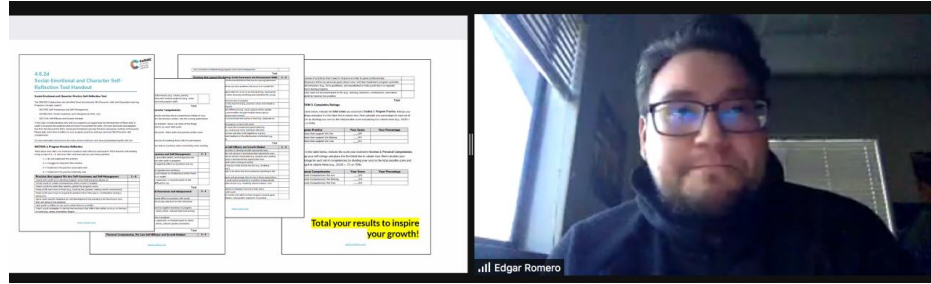
DATAZONE PARTNERSHIP

- Partnership with the Santa Clara County Office of Education's DataZone was solidified in Spring 2021.
- DataZone offers low-cost data warehousing with secure district partitions and role-based authentication.
- The partnership offers the City of San José and SJ Learns a few key benefits:
 - Provides high levels of data security
 - Enhances reliability in reporting structures
 - Opens the door for the possibility of longitudinal analyses
 - Establishes baseline relationship for analyses of other City programs/educational services
 - Strengthens partnership with SCCOE and City
 - Saves evaluation costs
- Deidentified reports for SJ Learns staff and SPR to use in alignment with evaluation activities.

RESILIENCE CORPS – WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

- Primary goal: Address economic and workforce development needs among university students.
- Secondary goal: Program designed to accelerate learning growth for K-12 students in San Jose.
- Ensure that financially struggling college and graduate school students living in San Jose's high-poverty census tracts have employment in their desired field, earning a living wage.
- Place qualified Associates with high-quality and well-established expanded learning program providers serving San Jose students, including city agency program providers.

****This initiative is not a stand-alone tutoring program developed and implemented by Resilience Corps***

63 Participants

- 50 currently employed
- 10 found permanent positions
- 3 dropped the program

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS

Californians for All Youth Jobs Corps Program

- Must be between 16-30 years of age

Priority should be given to youth who:

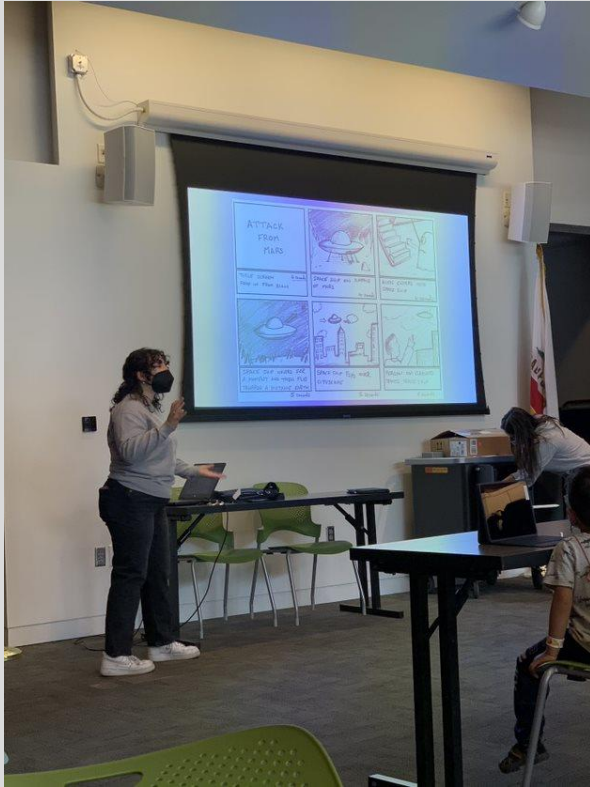
- Have not participated in an AmeriCorps program
- May have difficulty finding employment
- Are low-income
- Are unemployed and/or out of school
- Are or were justice-involved
- Are in or transitioning from foster care
- Are engaged with the mental health or substance abuse system
- Priority applicants (meeting two of above criteria) should make up no fewer than 75% of selected participants
- First generation college student

Associates will

- Focus on student-centered supportive programs.
- Focus on low-resourced census tracts, prioritizing branches in communities that serve our most at-need populations.

Recommendations

- Small cohorts, keeping 2/3 Associates together at locations.
- In Summer 2022, support summer lunch, summer learning, and facilitate public programs that support academic and school success.
- In Fall 2022, support school supportive programs like Reading Buddies, Coding programs, Homework Clubs, and any other **branch-specific afterschool programs.**
