A. Homelessness Response Team Youth RFP (N. Hossain)

Housing Department Analyst, Nosheen Hossian, presented on the Direct Cash Transfer and Services program. The program is an effort to help divert homelessness with young adults ages 18-24 who are at or entering homelessness. The program provides funds to organizations with program proposals that help target young adults with institutional history and established alternative means of at-risk or experiencing homelessness. The program must serve a minimum 40 participants with a monthly unconditional stipend of \$1,000 per month for 21 months. Program proposals by organizations must list criteria on how participants are selected and integrate community-identified frameworks into their program design.
