AFRICANA, ASIAN AMERICAN, CHICANO, & NATIVE AMERICAN STUDIES CENTER



The Africana, Asian American, Chicano, & Native American Studies Center is made up of four collections located on the fifth floor of the Library. These collections support academic programs and classes at SJSU. An Advisory Board made of SJSU faculty and staff, along with community members, provides assistance with programming and exhibits. The intent of these collections is the following:

- To create a nurturing academic support center for students.
- To encourage the development of information literacy skills to help students become lifelong learners who can access, evaluate, and effectively use all library resources.
- To foster in students a deeper understanding of and pride in their respective cultures and an appreciation and understanding of other cultures.
- To give all SJSU students a greater appreciation and understanding of the history and culture of the Africana, Asian American, Chicano, and Native American communities.
- To provide a collection of comparative multicultural resources to facilitate research between cultures.
- To work collaboratively with their respective communities in San José to create programming opportunities.



CHICANO COLLECTION



SJSU Chicano Resource Center to the Chicano Collection

- Arose in 1979/1980 out of planning efforts of faculty from the Mexican American Studies Department, the College of Social Work, the bilingual program in the College of Education, and the University Library.
- Dedicated in 1982, the Chicano Resource Center has provided a single focus for books, periodicals, reference tools, pamphlets, and clippings relating to Mexican American History, culture, and community.
- In 2003, with the merge of SJPL and SJSU libraries, the Chicano Resource Center, became part of the AAACNA Studies Center and is now the Chicano Collection.

CHICANO COLLECTION



Chicano Commencement: Collection of programs have been digitized and made available online. The 50th anniversary of the Chicano walkout that started Chicano Commencement will be made available soon in SJSU's Special Collections.

Danny Trevino: Long before Black Lives Matter, a young Chicano male was killed by San José police in January 1976 for sitting in his car. This collection reflects the organizing of a community demanding City officials to investigate the police and the instances surrounding the shooting of Danny Trevino.

Our latest project is **Before Silicon Valley: Mexican Agricultural and Cannery Workers of Santa Clara County, 1920-1960.** A collaborative project with public historian Prof. Margo McBane, along with a team of other individuals, we are documenting Mexican migration, work, cultural life, and civil rights activism in Santa Clara County. https://library.sjsu.edu/b4sv

Acequia Institute Photograph Collection: AAACNA's first digital photograph collection, documents the history of Mexican American farming in the Upper Rio Grande watershed in New Mexico and Colorado, but primarily in the San Luis Valley in Colorado. The photographs come from the Acequia Institute, a non-profit organization dedicated to research, education, and program extension to support the flourishing of the acequias, or communal irrigation canals, farming communities. https://digitalcollections.sisu.edu/aaacna





Budget Proposals Not Moved Forward

- Expansion of Library Security Staffing and Services at Library Locations
 - Full proposal included the addition of 2.0 FTE Senior
 Librarian positions to allow for a dedicated manager for
 high incident branches that currently have shared
 supervision at more than one site.
- Reduce Barriers to Library Use by Eliminating Late Fines Fines Free for All
 - The City has supported the removal of fines as a barrier to access by restructuring most Library fees and eliminating fines for youth materials only.

Alignment with Mayor's June Budget Message

- Youth Commission one-time increase of \$11,000 to invest in their leadership skills.
- Continuation of the Library Fines Forgiveness for Seniors includes a one-time waiving of fines for Seniors in FY 2023-2024 up to \$5,000.
- Partnership with Hispanic Foundation of Silicon Valley to further strengthen their ability to empower aspiring students to achieve their educational & career goals, one-time funding of \$25,000.
- Partnership with Escuela Popular to support and foster intergenerational learning opportunities in East Side San José, one-time funding of \$15,000.


