## **VOLUNTEER FEEDBACK SURVEY**

#### DATA COLLECTION METHOD

- Conducted in early Spring
- Online Survey distributed via email to all "Accepted" volunteers

### Previously:

- 68 total responses
- 5 volunteer experience questions
- 8 volunteer satisfaction questions
- 3 free answer questions
- 3 demographic questions



## FY 21-22 Volunteer Feedback Survey

- 95% would recommend SJPL as a place to volunteer
- 93% feel comfortable approaching a staff member when they have a question
- 94% felt prepared for their volunteer role





#### **ACQUISITIONS BUDGET - COMPARISON**




### ACQUISITIONS BUDGET - OVERVIEW





#### LIBRARY SMALL TALK

HE BOOKMAN for December reports a curious literary experiment reminiscent of the librarian a own attempt to inter est the people of San Jose in good books through the medium of readings and book reviews The New York Globe in connection with the Lincoln society of Brooklyn is attempting a series of "literaly concerts at monthly intervals. These are made up of a combination of musical numbers and readings the latter being esprelatly from the classics of litcrature It is hoped thus to awaken an interest in the great books among those to whom their acquaintance has been denied or who have lightly passed them by with the assumption that they must be dull

The leader of the enterprise Mr Charles D issuesnon, fontures that portion of the program which he calls Fae to Pace With the Great Authors On each occusion he attempts to present some one author in a human and interesting aspect much as f'rof Gay . ley of the University of Ciltornia used to do in his half-hour renderings of single books Interest is further, fortified by authors readings of their own works. mun, authors giving their services to foster so worthy an undertaklork Times book review hermit; fi ation of the plants described Roosevelt discurses a recent book. The Hidden People by Leo E Miler This is a tule of a lost ruce hidden away in a remote receas of the Andes in the region of Peru and Bolivia He describes the book as a happy blending of Rider Haggard and Captain Mayne Iteld and mentions the pleasure that his father took in the books of those authors which he had owned and passed on to his sons The former author is still writing (Finlaned 1917 Love Ecternal 1918) but Mayne Reid is but a dim memory of delight to an older generation A German literary historian once called him the best of American writers of fiction, a curious error as Reid was born in Ireland and tived most of his life in England lie spent reveral venrs howevet in the United blates, where he got the almosphere for his Indian stories served with distinction in the Mexican war and for a short time edited a journal in New York City We wonder sometimes if any of the new stories for children can be so thilling as The Desert 21ome

Liberty theatre takets for the library s fund may also be bought at the Garden City bank, at O Briens and at the Heroid shoe A limited edition of the work has been published with at illustrations beat tifully hand colored by Muttle Hill McQuarrie which adds as much to the ultiliv as to the charm of the book Healdes the matter on character and bab: tat of the flowers which is ex peried in works of the sort the took is enriched by much literary and leng ndary lore. An appendix deals with the necessity of the preservation of our flowering plants and shrubs The book would surely make a most ac coptable gift to all who are lovers of flowers and the great California out-of-doors

Many patrons of the library are evidently not aware that the !! brary takes a great many perudicals which are not displayed in covers for la k of resources both of money and space. These per indicals which cannot be displayed include many valuable magazines which are purchased and paid for by the library as well as prac tically all those which come to the library as gifts Lovers of periodical reading should examine the posted lists in order to better acquaint themselves with the mag azines in the library of which there are vastis more than a casual look about would lead one to believe








#### CIRCULATION

**3,379,515 Materials Circulated** (July – Jan)


